Pat's Impact: Pat's attention to detail combined with her compassionate nature makes her approachable and easy to work with while ensuring the critical financial and human resource details that keep an organization functioning are in order. While she is often behind the scenes making payroll and health insurance happen for CCLC staff, one co-worker said, "when I am unsure of a work situation and even in a personal situation, sitting with Pat always makes me feel better."

Pat was introduced to CCLC when she attended two workshops in its early years focused on giving voice to community needs and promoting social change for women. She became even more drawn to CCLC when she learned of its focus on promoting wellbeing for all. When CCLC called on her to help with payroll on a day thereafter dubbed "Pat Mallar Day" due to her critical support in a time of need, she decided to stay on as a permanent em-



ployee. When describing her dedication to CCLC over the years she reflected, "It feeds me on a personal level to be a part of CCLC's mission, vision, and values."

"I look at the CCLC as a navigational aid–a lighthouse with a bright beacon, helping people navigate new experiences, education, and community cohesiveness. People are learning, prospering and growing, in ways they maybe never could have imagined, because of the CCLC. I know I have, as both an employee and as a participant."

The warmth that Pat imbues her work with at CCLC came through in reflections from her co-workers. From supplying water balloons to liven up the annual Pat Mallar Day celebration to welcoming newcomers, distributing paychecks, overseeing finances and being an empathetic listener, Pat makes CCLC's work possible and the workplace welcoming. As one co-worker put it, Pat "naturally makes a workplace feel like home."

Kevin's Impact: Through his drive to help CCLC provide opportunities that might not otherwise be available, Kevin does whatever it takes to support CCLC's work. From combing through the facilities during power outages and snowstorms to making sure everything is functioning to managing the entire information technology system to providing pottery classes to the community, one co-worker described Kevin as "the axle that keeps the CCLC turning."

Back when CCLC was just an idea between community members, Kevin was demonstrating his skills as a potter at the Grand Lake Stream Folk Art Festival on a rainy summer day. Alan Furth, future Executive Director of CCLC, was there with his band in need of a dry place to play music. Kevin offered some room under his dry tent where he was demonstrating his craft and they struck up a friendship. Alan described watching festival-goers on that day "become mesmerized by the transformations of clay being conjured

by his skilled hands from mound to elegant vessel...Kevin was both a skilled artist but clearly also a skilled teacher." Not long after, Alan and the other founders of CCLC invited Kevin to design and teach one of CCLC's first educational offerings: Earth, Form, and Fire: a Raku pottery class.

"My main drive for working here is to provide opportunities that wouldn't otherwise be available."

Kevin then became one of the first paid staff of CCLC and committed himself to its development. He created CCLC's first website, helped clear the land for the first building, and to this day continues to make sure all systems on campus run smoothly. This dedication to the people and place that compose CCLC came through in reflections from his co-workers; as one of them said, "He genuinely cares about us and it shows." As a potter, Kevin sees potential in an often messy lump of earth then patiently forms the clay into a masterpiece. Similarly, Kevin saw the potential of CCLC at the beginning and has patiently and masterfully embedded beauty and function into the organization ever since.

Staff Profile • Ryan Cross


Joined: 2013 Groundskeeper / Maintenance

Michael's Impact: Michael first came to CCLC not in response to an open position, but with an idea for an outdoor program that would be accessible to Washington County youth. He helped create and run the Cobscook Outdoor Adventure Club to make outdoor programs for 8-14 year-olds accessible, then became a teacher for the Cobscook Experiential Program, where he continues to teach and learn with high school students through outdoor, hands-on experiences.

Michael first moved to the region to attend University of Maine at Machias (UMM) after travels with his grandparents as a child revealed to him the grit and tenacity of coastal communities. Reflecting on his decision to move here, he said, "I came to Machias to be a part of a community that was strong and resilient;


